Message from the Mayor




There's a lot going on around our Village, from our annual Safety Meeting to a Cellular Ordinance Moratorium, from a Stipulation of Settlement on the Old Westbury Water Tower to an extended Dog Law.

I find it almost shocking that in a small Village such as ours that we could have suffered a storm that literally devastated the northwest corner of Brookville and hardly any of our other residents even knew about it!

In spite of the “instant” communications we now all enjoy, the fact is that on Thursday, July 19th, in the late afternoon, a sudden storm popped up with tornado-like attributes; hail rained down the size of golf balls, streets flooded, traffic stalled, electricity, cable and phones were knocked out and over 1,400 trees sheared off — all within a matter of minutes. Whitney Lane, and Norgate were both closed off to homeowners for nearly a day. (See the photos on pp 6 and 7.) The Weather Channel officially dubbed this storm a microburst —ravaging only a very small area — before moving onto a more “important” story. But it was a cruel reminder of how quickly Mother Nature can do us in. And another reminder of how important it is to have a Personal Safety Plan in place for you and your family.

The Village of Brookville will hold its fourth annual Safety Meeting at the regular Board of Trustees meeting on Tuesday, September 11th at the AHRC on Wheatley Road. The purpose of this gathering will be to provide residents with an opportunity to hear the latest safety information in three key areas: Police, Fire and Water. And to ask any questions you may have.

The meeting will start promptly at 6:30 p.m. with a commemorative ceremony by the OBPD Honor Guard to recognize and remember those who gave their lives on 9/11.

Richard Smith, our new Chief of the OBPD since June 2011, will provide simple and effective crime prevention tips regarding home security. He will also share ways in which the residents can assist the police department to help keep Brookville safe. He will also take questions from residents as to their concerns.

John Lottes, a LUHI staff member and 21-year volunteer and Assistant Chief of the Jericho Fire Department, will talk about home fire safety and the steps you can take to better protect your family and yourself, including new technologies that can be life savers. He will also talk about emergency medical services and what you might expect if you ever need to call 911 for medical reasons.

Peter Logan, Superintendent of the Jericho Water District, will provide us with an update on the State of Brookville's water, including the latest information on

We bought our house in 2009 and have been fairly content with our decision to move here. However, our peaceful life living in Brookville has been tainted with noise coming from planes continuously passing by... There are rules and regulations that govern how high the planes must fly and restricts (them) to fly at certain times of the day. JFK airport is clearly violating this law. I have contacted JFK manager Jerry Spampinato to advise him of our concern. However, one voice is not good enough it seems. I have also filed a complaint

with the FAA by sending an email to the Aviation Noise Ombudsman. I am sincerely asking for your support.

Mayor's Note: Thank you for your followup on behalf of this issue. The Village has also been monitoring this closely. It is our opinion that the noise from overhead planes has been dramatically reduced in 2012. I'd welcome hearing from other residents. Below is a letter responding to the Kim's from the FAA.

Dear Mrs. Kim,
We have followed up on your inquiry and learned that your community is primarily impacted by arrivals to John F. Kennedy International Airport (JFK) using a long-established arrival pattern. Additionally, there is a new JFK departure procedure that can send aircraft over these communities, but the large majority of these are above 10,000 feet altitude over Brookville. Please recognize that the overall noise footprint from all of the aircraft operating at JFK continues to be reduced from levels experienced in past years. The primary reason for this reduction is that aircraft are becoming quieter as the technology advances to improve fuel efficiency and environmental performance. To the extent that airlines can afford to purchase and operate newer aircraft with advanced technologies, this trend may continue. In addition, more efficient air traffic control techniques allow aircraft to get on the ground and climb out of the area more quickly; and, on November 1st, our controllers began placing a renewed effort on maintaining maximum safe altitudes on aircraft approaches to JFK. The FAA's mission is to ensure the safe and efficient use of our nation's navigable airspace. The agency does not have the authority to prohibit aircraft overflights of a particular geographic area unless the operation is unsafe, or the aircraft is operated in a manner inconsistent with Federal Aviation Regulations. STIPULATION OF SETTLEMENT REACHED WITH WATER TOWER PROJECT AT SUNY OLD WESTBURY CAMPUS

In the last issue of our newsletter, we reported that the Village of Old Westbury (VOW) and the State University at Old Westbury (SUNY OW) planned to build an unsightly water tower at SUNY within 300' of our borders.

With the help of Senator Carl Marcellino, it was

discovered that the elevated water tank was not being constructed in the location approved by New York State. And that in fact, the site cleared was actually in a Buffer Zone imposed by New York State that rings the campus and which provides a screen between our borders. As a result, we were able to get the construction stopped, pending further discussions with OW and New York State.

After negotiations broke down between our Villages, Brookville was left with no alternative other than to start legal action in Supreme Court. It was our position that Brookville had a legitimate interest in protecting its aesthetic resources and the character of the existing neighborhood and that Old Westbury's failure to notify Brookville during the review process was in violation of the law. Furthermore, it was our position that Old Westbury had failed to take the required hard look at the environmental consequences of the tower on our Village and that Old Westbury had improperly failed to adhere to its zoning regulations in approving the project.

Fortunately, after months in Court, it appears that our lawsuit has now been settled. (We are still awaiting formal approval from Old Westbury and New York State, but we expect it to be forthcoming.) The Village of Old Westbury has agreed to suspend work on their proposed \$4-million dollar, 165-foot tall, one-million gallon water tower within the SUNY OW campus at the foot of our Village.

Although Old Westbury has not agreed to discontinue the eventual construction of the tower, they have agreed that in consideration of Brookville's withdrawal of its suit against Old Westbury without prejudice, that if and when Old Westbury decides to re-commence the project that:

1. Brookville will be notified in writing and have an opportunity to be involved in and to participate in the environmental review process, as an interested party.
2. Upon the completion of the environmental review, Brookville will have all rights, remedies and entitlements under law with respect to any action taken.
3. Old Westbury has agreed that under no circumstances will any land designated as "open space" and/or "buffer acreages" be encroached upon for any purpose in connection with the construction, including clearing of trees, foundation work, or storage.
4. Old Westbury has also agreed that they will remove all work, materials, improvements and installations at the site, including concrete footings, foundations, piping, conduits, fencing, roadways and such.
5. Old Westbury has agreed to fill and regrade the area that was wrongfully cleared and they will plant the area with trees, shrubs and other vegetation in order to eventually return the cleared areas to their natural wooded condition prior to the construction.

The tower, if erected at the permitted location, would have been clearly visible in several parts of Brookville, especially at Broadhollow and the southern end of our Village.

By the time Brookville became aware of the construction of the tower, it had already been approved by New York State as an alleged safety measure to protect an expanding college campus and surrounding residents. It was also to serve as a cell tower.

In principle, the government of our Village is not against building a water tower on the SUNY OW campus. Unfortunately, the proposed water tower was to be situated where it would reduce their costs and cause the least impact on Old Westbury and the SUNY OW campus – with no regard to its detrimental effects on our Village and residents. If Old Westbury should decide to proceed with this project, and if it once again impinges upon our Village, we now have full remedies available to us to contest this project.

LAURA DOUGHERTY HONORED – ONE OF LI’s “TOP ADVOCATES FOR HISTORIC PRESERVATION AND EDUCATION”

More than 200 people attended the Oyster Bay Historical Society Awards Reception on July 10th at the Woodlands where Laura Dougherty was honored as one of the top 20 advocates for Long Island history. Her honors included work on a special project for our Village, “From Joan of Arc To The Duke Of Windsor – 80 Years Of Fame And Fortune In Brookville.” Laura archived and researched this project which focused on the history of Brookville with concentration on the years surrounding the 1931 incorporation. It was displayed at the 80th Anniversary party for the Village held last year.

The exhibit showcased “Important Properties” including biographies of the residents who owned them, the architects and landscape architects that designed them, and fascinating stories about the Village at that time. Additional focus was placed on “Significant Entities” that included the Nike Site, “Old Syc,” the Universities and the horse trails. Currently, Laura is working on a book to be published under the same name.

The Oyster Bay Historical Society, www.oysterbayhistorical.org/, is a not-for-profit organization dedicated to creating a broad public interest in awareness of the rich and distinctive history of the Town of Oyster Bay and to stimulate and educate the community through exhibitions, programs,

and publications designed to interpret our past, to reflect on our future, and to bring our history to life in the present.

In addition to serving as Village Historian, Laura serves as an officer and board member of the Brookville Park Foundation. A resident of Brookville for many years, wife of the late Harold Dougherty, Laura is active in many areas of community service.

She recently retired from L’Oreal USA as métier head and Director of Development for the Ralph Lauren Fragrance Division. During her tenure, she spent much time Europe where she did extensive development work in the perfumery glass factories of France and Italy. Laura is a summa cum laude graduate of LIU/Post and a licensed real estate broker.

BROOKVILLE PARK FOUNDATION MEMBERS & FRIENDS VISIT ST. JOSEPHAT'S MONASTERY IN LATTINGTOWN

Members and friends of the Brookville Park Foundation were in for a real treat at the annual BPF Outing in late June: they toured St. Josephat's Monastery, off Lattingtown Road in Lattingtown. Father Leo Goldade, OSMB, long associated with this property, headed the monastery tour. It was followed by lunch at the beautiful Seawanhaka Corinthian Yacht Club on Centre Island.



St. Josephat's is a magnificent 100-acre estate with an incredible history. Originally called Ormston House, it was built circa 1916 at a cost of nearly \$3 million by J.E. Aldred, a utility magnate whose fortune was at that time estimated to be worth more than \$80 million from investments in hydro-electric power, public utility securities as well as in the Gillette Safety Razor Co.



In 1910, Mr. Aldred, along with Charles H. Pratt (founder of Standard Oil), John Paul Getty and W.D. Guthrie, bought out the entire Incorporated Village of Lattingtown by purchasing all of the 60 houses and homes that constituted the Village which were then demolished. Aldred, himself, purchased 26 parcels of land (half of the Village) and additionally paid \$30,000 to the State of New York for property under water to protect his beach rights. It was on this property that his house was built. The Ormsted Brothers (landscape designers of Central Park) were commissioned to design the gardens and the famous architects Bertram B. Goodhue and Henry W. Rowe were commissioned to design the 74 room house and outbuildings. By 1931, Aldred was associated with 37 large companies either as an executive or

a director. By 1940, he had lost his fortune and the ownership of Ormston House was taken over by the Baltimore Light and Power Company.

In 1944, the Ukrainian Catholic Rite Basilian Fathers acquired the estate for a mere \$75,000. In 1958, the monastery became a novitiate. A retreat house was established in 1964 and a library complex was completed in 1982. Over half of the Basilian Fathers working in this country have either had their beginnings at St. Josephat's or have been closely connected with its development. It is truly remarkable to have nearby St. Josephat's Monastery located on this still magnificent and pristine estate.

UPDATES, NOTICES & EVENTS AROUND THE VILLAGE

ROADS UPDATE: The 2012 Road Project - Improvement of Heather Hill Road and Paddock Court has been completed. New milling and paving were done on both roads and a storm drain pipe interconnecting two catch basins was replaced. After months of back and forth with Nassau County we are happy to report that the County has approved the resurfacing of Wheatley Road, from Route 107 to Northern Boulevard (25A). Nassau

County has informed us that resurfacing of Wheatley Road, west of Route 107 is still in the design stages and further information will follow.

MORATORIUM ON APPROVAL AND CONSTRUCTION OF TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES PASSED AT JULY BOT MEETING: In a unanimous vote at a special meeting of the Board of Trustees in July, a local law entitled Moratorium on Approval and Construction of Telecommunication Facilities was approved. “Given the recent rapid growth in demand for wireless service,” said Mayor Caroline Bazzini, “the purpose of this law is to allow our Village government adequate time and opportunity to explore pertinent issues and concerns with input from our residents regarding the local approval of telecommunication facilities within the Village.”

Brookville’s current telecommunications ordinance is 13 years old. There have been enormous changes in technology since that time. This moratorium will enable Brookville the time to update its current ordinance and address these changes. This will include the future siting, installation and expansion of all telecommunications facilities in a manner that will minimize any adverse affects while allowing communication services to be provided in accordance with the provisions of the Telcom Act of 1996.

NYS-MANDATED LOCAL LAW AMENDMENT ON CHANGING “DOGS” TO “ANIMALS” PASSED AT JULY BOT MEETING: For the second time in three years, a local law to amend Chapter 98, entitled “Dogs” of the Code of the Incorporated Village of Brookville was passed by the Board of Trustees. The vote was 3 to 1 with one Trustee absent. The purpose of the amendment, mandated by New York State, is to extend the regulations of the ordinance to all types of animals (not just dogs) and to prohibit the depositing of animal waste or damaging the property of any person other than the animal’s owner or custodian. This law also mandates that “animal waste deposited on any public street, road, or highway, including the rights-of-way or other public place or private property owned by another person, located within the Village is strictly prohibited, unless the waste is immediately removed in a sanitary manner.”

HURRICANE SEASON IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER... AND SNOW STORMS ARE RIGHT BEHIND: The late July microblast that hit the north west corner of Brookville was a cruel and sudden reminder of how quickly we can lose utilities. We were “lucky” that the storm was not island wide or getting energized would have been a much bigger ordeal. (Brookville was 99% back online within 28 hours.) Brookville represents approximately 675 LIPA customers. By numbers, we are considered low-density population. As a result, we fall at the bottom of the totem pole when it comes to power restoration. And the fact remains that LIPA continues to look to put the most people back on line in the shortest period of time. So if you’ve been toying with the idea of getting a generator, now is the time to be taking action — before a tropical storm, hurricane or worse leaves you without electricity.

ORDINANCES FOR NEW HOME CONSTRUCTION & ADDITIONS UNDER REVIEW: The Village is reviewing its zoning regulations as it pertains to building new homes and additions. More specifically, the Village is considering eliminating the president Maximum Permitted Volume regulations and replacing them with a more simplified Maximum Permitted Square Footage regulation. This should make it easier for our residents to plan and obtain permits for their new construction without being hampered by complicated volume issues. We will keep you posted as this progresses.



BROOKVILLE HAS LOST A GOOD FRIEND – FORMER BUILDING INSPECTOR, HAROLD M. DOUGHERTY DIES AT 95

1916-2012

Born on Halloween (10/31/16), Harold M. Dougherty, long-time Building Inspector, passed away peacefully at his home on Easter Sunday (4/8/12). He was 95 years old.

After a long and varied career including serving in the Navy and WWII, Harold, who owned his own plumbing business, joined the staff of the Village of Brookville. In the early 1960s, he was appointed Plumbing Inspector under Brookville Mayor Kevin Waite. In 1969, when LeRoy Newell, the Building Inspector retired, Harold took his place. He continued to work in that position for the next 43 years – sharing that work load with his son ,Tim, after he graduated from Rochester Institute of Technology (Class of 1984) with an Engineering Degree. In 1994 Harold retired but remained with the Village as a consultant. As of earlier this year Harold was still participating in Village Board meetings.

Harold was born and bred in Brooklyn. As a young boy, Harold often passed the Belt Parkway Stables. And so it came to be that he dreamed of owning a horse one day. Little did he imagine that eventually he'd own eight horses, play polo and be the master of the hunt!

Prior to being drafted into the Navy toward the end of WWII, he worked on war ships for the Todd Shipyards in Brooklyn. He was a founding member and great supporter of St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church when it was built at the southern end of Brookville in the late 60s. In 1992, Harold met Laura

Varrichio. He was instantly smitten, but it took seven years before he was able to convince Laura to marry him. He often joked that it was his longest project. They lived happily together for over 13 years.

Laura said that their dog, Erin, was with her at the funeral home, in the church and at the interment. Erin was certified as Mr. Dougherty's support animal and spent much time with him in hospitals this past year. "She is a wonderful little poodle who is very smart and very well mannered. Erin also makes visits to the Life Enrichment Center and brings joy to the seniors who lunch there," said Laura.

When the Mayor was asked to recall memories of Harold, besides his love for wife, family, and Village, it is his loyalty, affability and quick sense of humor that those who knew him remember best. A gentleman and good friend always. "His tireless service as a Village official will always be appreciated and remembered by the residents of this Village whom he served so unselfishly," said Mayor Caroline Z. Bazzini.

Harold is survived by his wife, Laura K. Varrichio Dougherty, and his three children, Timothy H. Dougherty and Jill Warga of Brookville, and Amy Dougherty Cinque, of Orlando, Florida; plus his grandchildren, Kimberly and Christopher Warga, and Joseph and Natalie Cinque.

Sergeant Michael Clarke Receives Commendation For Saving a Man's Life

Sergeant Michael Clarke was recently recognized by the Village for saving a man's life when he was driving through Oyster Bay on his way to the Village of Cove Neck. He was flagged down and informed that a 59-year-old male was unconscious in a commercial building used for boat restorations in Theodore Roosevelt Park. Sergeant Clarke found the victim unconscious with bystanders performing CPR.

Sergeant Clarke utilized an automated external defibrillator device (AED) and administered one shock to the man's heart in an effort to revive him. Within 30 seconds of delivering the shock the male victim regained a pulse and began breathing on his own. The

man was successfully revived and was transported to Syosset Hospital for further treatment. Sergeant Michael Clarke is a 22-year veteran of the Old Brookville Police Department.

MORATORIUM ON APPLICATIONS FOR TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES NOW IN PLACE. In July, we held a special Board of Trustees meeting at which we passed a six-month moratorium on applications for telecommunications facilities in our Village. This was done in order to give us time to review our current Telecommunications Ordinance. There have been so many changes in technology since our Ordinance was put into place 13 years ago that I felt it prudent to have it professionally reviewed and updated.
